ADVATEST EARLY CANCER DETECTION AND PHARMACOGENOMICS DNA TESTING BY ORAL SWAB Tuesday, January 22, Beginning at 9:00 a.m. **Call Member Services to Be Put on the List Phillips Center Hallway**

Advatest facilitates two quick, easy tests for people wishing to learn more about their own health status and predispositions. Genetic testing is an essential means for long-term understanding of one's own health traits or tendencies.

Tests are conducted via a noninvasive oral swab, which is submitted to a laboratory for processing. The tests offer valuable information for both patients and their doctors to create informed strategies for appropriate diagnostic plans, monitoring, and any potential treatments.

Test 1: Pharmacogenetic (PGX) testing indicates ways that genes affect how someone will react to specific drug treatments. This helps physicians prescribe medications for maximum effectiveness and minimal adversity.

Test 2: Cancer genomics screening (CGx) provides critical insight on the ways that genetic mutations might create risks for various cancers. Early detection through this type of testing increases chances for survival and successful treatment. Angie Welch with Advatest will be at ACV Tuesday, January 22, to perform swabs. She will begin

at 9:00 a.m., and she is prepared to stay several hours, if needed, to perform the test on everyone who wants it done that day. They work directly with most insurance companies so that the tests are at no cost to the consumer. Advatest secures coverage before the tests are run, so there are no surprise bills. The process takes approximately 15 minutes per

person. To keep people from having to sit and wait, Member Services (658-5400) is compiling a "wait list". If you would like to schedule a time to have your swab done, call Member Services to put your name on the list. If you are not on the list, you will most likely have to sit and wait until you can be fit in.

You need to bring your license/ID, insurance card, and your list of medications. For the PGX test, you must be on at least two prescription drugs. For the CGx test, you need to have a personal cancer history and/or have two family members with a cancer history. Your insurance company will only receive notice that you had the test done; they will not receive the results of your test unless you send it to them. You can have the results of your test sent to up to two doctors. Shortly after you receive the results of your test, a counselor will contact you to ask if you have any questions. If you would like to speak with Angie about the

tests, or to schedule an appointment to have the tests performed at another time, call her at (386) 365-3530.

It's very important to keep your Medicare card safe and in good condition. Your wallet may be a good place to keep it because you can then have it with you at doctor visits. But do safeguard it, as you would an identity document or credit card.

The Social Security department advises against card lamination in general because the card may have built-in security features that could be compromised by lamination. As an alternative, for a few dollars at your local business supply store, you can purchase a plastic ID card holder to protect your Medicare card. The card will be safe, and security features will not be compromised. (The same goes for your Social Security card.)

If you lose your Medicare card, or it gets damaged, you can contact Social Security Administration in any of the following ways to get it replaced: Visit the Social Security website at www.ssa.gov, call the agency at 1-800-772-1213, or visit your local Social Security office.


