

Meet Our President Elect and His Wife by Delysia McNair

President-Elect of the 2019 Member Council is Lowell Lueptow. Member Association officers serve a three-year term, as President-Elect, and then President, and then Past President. Lowell and his wife, Sue, moved to Park Springs in 2014 and live in the 9200 building.



Born in Columbus, Wisconsin, Lowell has one older brother. His dad was a businessman and his mother, a homemaker. Later, the family moved to Madison, where Lowell went to high school. "I was always involved with volunteer work," Lowell remembered. "I was very active in Junior Red Cross and later, chaired the University Blood Drive." He graduated from the University of Wisconsin, majoring in Economics.

Lowell met Sue when both were serving as delegates from their high schools, to the Dane County Junior Red Cross Council. Sue, an only child, was born and raised n Stoughton, Wisconsin, a small town settled manly by Norwegian immigrants. "It was so Norwegian; if you were in Norway, you'd never know the difference," she said. Many spoke Norwegian and the church services were conducted in Norwegian once a month. Sue's dad was in an oil distribution business and her mother was a homemaker. It was in her high school volunteering, when she was 16, that she met Lowell. She attended Vassar College for two years before transferring to the University of Wisconsin, because their Sociology department was superior (and maybe a little because Lowell was there).

Sue and Lowell were married in May 1955, she was 21 and he 23. With his graduation from college and his four years in the ROTC, Lowell became a 2nd Lieutenant in the Army, reporting for duty at Camp Gordon, in Augusta, GA.

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Leafing through the latest issue of World Wildlife, I read an interesting piece about Neville Isdell, outgoing chairman of WWF-US. I must admit, the name was not a familiar one to me, but the story intrigued me due to his

early life in Africa. Though his higher education was in social work, he entered the business world taking his first job with Coca-Cola in Zambia. He was successful and advanced through the company in Zambia, South Africa, Australia, the Philippines, central Europe and eventually the United States. His early life in Africa greatly influenced his attitude toward conservation of resources. He retired from Coca-Cola at the age of 58 but in 2004, he returned as Chairman and CEO. At the time, the company was in a downturn. Five years later it had returned to Fortune Five Hundred at #12 and was operating in the black. Isdell convinced company leaders to join with WWF to focus on reducing its "environmental footprint" and protecting the world's freshwater. He was determined to advocate conservation of the company's main ingredient--water. Since 2007, this partnership has worked tirelessly to preserve freshwater ecosystems around the world. Locally, he founded the Isdell Center for Global Leadership at Pace Academy in Atlanta. He has recently stepped down from his position with WWF Board Read more about him and his global efforts for conversation.

Jan. 31 – Brandon Gerberich is a senior PhD candidate and researcher in the Laboratory for Drug Delivery at Ga Tech headed by Dr. Mark Prausnitz. Dr. Prausnitz's laboratory is best known for developing microneedles for drug delivery in the skin with notoriety, especially for an influenza vaccine microneedle patch that eliminates the need for hypodermic needles. Brandon's research is focused on developing treatments for diseases of the eye using chemical engineering techniques to localize or enhance effects of therapeutic agents. Currently, he is working on a treatment for glaucoma.

Meet our President Elect Cont...

Sue graduated from the U. of W. in January 1956, and she joined him in Augusta. Later, he was posted to Camp McCoy, Wisconsin as the Korean War was ending. He then served in the Army Reserves for several years. Known for his earlier volunteer work, Lowell joined the staff of the American Cancer Society in 1956, as a Field Representative, with an area of 18 counties, in southern Wisconsin. Their daughter, Rebekka, was born in 1957, and then Sarah in 1959.

When Lowell became state director of the Society's Arizona division, they moved to Scottsdale in 1962. In 1968, their third daughter, Anne, was born. Sue enjoyed sewing and making many of the girls' clothes. She was very active in civic activities, including church, AAUW, PTA and of course, volunteer work for the American Cancer Society.

Sue's father died when she was 21. Her mother remarried to a family friend who accepted an overseas assignment in Iran with the Near East Foundation (later, Point Four of the U.S Government). Sue and the two older daughters, then only five and three, flew to Iran to be with them, while Lowell was settling in his new job in Arizona. Sue and the two girls stayed in Iran for six months, and she recalls, "It was my first experience in a foreign country. The people I met, mostly Shiite Muslims, were well educated, and under the rule of the Shah. They were friendly to Americans. The women were intrigued with an American woman and little girls with blonde hair. They were very hospitable, and the food was wonderful. Exploring the ancient Persian ruins of Persepolis was a highlight."

In 1974, when Lowell became the State Director for Washington State, they moved to the Seattle suburb of Mercer Island, where they lived for twelve years. Sue was busy with PTA and the AAUW, continuing volunteer work she had begun in Scottsdale.

In 1986, they moved to Weston, CT, so Lowell could commute to NY to carry out his duties as CFO of the National ACS headquarters. They loved the historical connections in the East, but it was cut short when the Society decided to end it's 75-year NYC location and move the headquaters to Atlanta. They built a home in Sandy Springs, living there until Lowell retired in 1992, following 38 years of service with the Society. They built their retirement home in north Scottsdale, in a desert community called "Sincuidados", near Carefree, where they enjoyed life for the next 20 years. They had time to travel, with domestic and international tours with Elderhostel, Abercrombie and Kent and Tauck tours. They also enjoyed swimming and hiking; both favorite activities of theirs. They somewhat slowed down when Sue had her first hip replacement, followed later by two more hip repairs. Lowell continued serving in Rotary, including gathering surplus medical supplies and equipment and taking them to Mexico where their local Rotary clubs distributed them to needy hospitals and nursing homes. His 25 years of Rotary service is one his most cherished memories.

The three daughters all married, and today they are blessed with six grandchildren; three boys and three girls. In 2013, the daughters met and agreed that Lowell and Sue should move near one of them. Sally Hutson gave them an impressive tour pf Park Springs and they decided "this is the place," near daughter Anne, who is in Tucker. They made the move in March 2014 and are happy to be here, where they've made many new friends and of course, they relish being near Anne's family where they see them once a week. Looking back over the years, Sue and Lowell agree that they've led a wonderful life; living in and exploring many different places in this great country, making friends wherever they've lived, bringing three children into this world and living long enough to see how they and their children fared.
