Benefit Sale generates \$80,000

"Success" is the term most used to describe the 61st annual *Benefit Sale* held Nov. 4-5 on the campus of Iowa Mennonite School.

Gross proceeds for the weekend exceeded just over \$80,000, reflecting a generous spirit of the local community.

"We are very appreciative of each one who donated monetary gifts or auction items, served on a committee or helped out the day of the sale or attended and purchased meals or other items," stated committee chair Nyle Kauffman.

"We need everyone to make the sale successful!"

A record 807 people ate the evening meal on Friday; the Saturday morning all-you-can-eat breakfast brought 339 people.

There were 447 auction items sold on either the silent or live auction, 60 of which were quilts, comforters or wall hangings. Twenty-seven meals in homes were sold.

Quilt prices ranged from \$30-1,050, with the *Challenge Quilt* bringing the highest bid.

Another popular sale item is the "Sweet Night of Music" at the *Home Place* located on Hwy. 22 between Kalona and Wellman. Owners Carey and Joani Miller will host an evening of desserts and music, with the music to be presented by *The Old Man Band*

and *Acoustic Music*. The scheduled evening is June 10, 2017, with the 11th offered as a rain date.

Tickets still remain for that event and can be purchased by contacting Larry Swartzendruber at Pleasantview.

Of course, no auction is complete or successful without auctioneers, clerks and cashiers. Employees of *Hills Bank & Trust* and *CBI Bank & Trust* do the clerking and cashiering. Auctioneers this year included Stan and Gentry Yoder, Dwight Duwa, Lloyd and Jerome Miller and Delmar Yoder.

Some final thoughts from Kauffman: "As with all auctions, some items go high and some go low, but each dollar adds up and benefits the Pleasantview residents. Wellness room renovations and a new secure, outdoor courtyard for memory care residents will be purchased with this year's net proceeds. Any additional funds will go toward the general welfare of Pleasantview residents.
