#### Lessons from the Easter story in Mark

Read Mark 16:1-8. The Easter story begins in the cemetery. There's still the whiff of death in the air... Grief and sorrow are a heavy weight for the women who made their way there early in the morning. They are afraid. They are grieving. They are still taking care of Jesus. He did not get a proper burial. They didn't have time! So they mustered their courage, gathered the spices, and together make their way to the tomb at the first opportunity. They just go ahead and do what they can: together, they make their way to the tomb, clutching the appropriate spice. As they walk, they wonder: "Who's going to roll the stone away from the entrance for us?"

Lesson 1: Sometimes we need to be like them. They knew what needed to be done with Jesus' body. So they just got ready to do it, not even knowing if they would be able to get in there and do it! Not knowing how they would roll the stone away from the entrance to



Jesus' tomb did not stop them. They had a holy thing to do for Jesus. One step at a time - don't let fear of future obstacles stop us from what we are able to do today!

Lesson 2: Don't stay at the foot of the cross. Like the women disciples, like the men disciples, moving away from the cross is challenging. At first they were all afraid. It was easier to hold onto fear, and anger, and grief. What do you mean Jesus didn't stay dead? That's not the way the world works. And that's exactly the point.

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The Easter news is that Jesus is still alive – in each of us. Jesus calls us, as he did the women and men disciples, to live according to the way of resurrection, not according to the world's rules, not



according to the world's rules, not according to the way of suffering and death. Live today knowing that death is not the end. Live today with the joy of new life. Live today. And DANCE! And SING! And REJOICE! He is risen! He is risen indeed!
