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# Stewards of Children— The Stars of Tomorrow

Stewardship can be defined as caring for something worth caring for. The children of the Kendal-Crosslands Communities Early Childhood Development Center are certainly that. They are also future stars—not only because some of the children whose little feet once frequented the Center's halls are now KCC staff members, they are also beneficiaries of the Keystone STARS program.

Created specifically to support early learning programs in Pennsylvania, Keystone STARS improves the quality of childhood development through Standards, Training/professional development, Assistance, Resources and Support. The program recognizes continuous quality improvement efforts in early learning in Pennsylvania. Early learning programs can earn from a STAR 1 to a STAR 4 level. At each level, programs have to meet certain research based quality standards that provides the foundation for accreditation.

KCC's Center has reached the STAR 2 level and is recognized by its fellow centers in the area for its high standards of care. KCC anticipates reaching STAR 4 level in the near future. Reaching higher STAR levels provides additional resources for the Center, including learning tools in areas such as science and math, toys and electronics.

KCC has had a child development center for over 20 years and today there are 16 children. The Center provides wonderful learning and caring spaces for children from toddler stage as they move forward to kindergarten. Beyond the STARS however, there is a place that's even more precious and that is the intergenerational experiences between the children and residents Every week, there are opportunities for fellowship between the children and residents. For example, for shared birthday parties the children make birthday cakes, hats and cards for residents. And when the children learn to swim, residents who frequent the pool are more than willing to be their teachers. KCC's little stars are not inhibited by their obvious distance in years but easily joined by a spirit that is delighted with a simple hello, sharing a smile, friendship, and care.



## Stewardship... The Environment

In 1681, William Penn specified that settlers coming to the lands granted to him by English King Charles II (Charles called it "Pennsylvania") must preserve one acre of trees for every five acres cleared. Their descendants extended Penn's farsighted conservation measures by planting and studying collections of trees.

Nearly 300 years after Penn, it's not surprising that Kendal-Crosslands Communities still maintains a focus on sustaining the natural environment. KCC's 500-acre Arboretum campus is surrounded by forests, meadows, tranquil water features, luscious manicured gardens, hiking trails and rolling hills. Preserving the campus' capacity to sustain and inspire, along with nature that nurtures, requires creative stewardship.

Recently, the National Wildlife Federation (NWF) designated KCC's campus as a Certified Wildlife Habitat site. NWF officially recognized the efforts of the Community to create outdoor spaces that improve habitats for birds, butterflies, frogs and other wildlife by providing essential elements needed by all wildlife—natural food sources, clean water, cover and places to raise young.

that prepares the high
school students to
transition from school
to adult life. KendalCrosslands has actively

Poe of Crosslands dining), has had students working with him for many years and has seen a change in their self-confidence from when they first walk in the door to when they graduate. The students rotate within the dining and laundry departments at both Kendal at Longwood and Crosslands. With the help from their mentors and job coaches, they acquire new skills with the aim of being gainfully employed upon graduation. Vernon Barrett, Laundry Manager at Kendal at Longwood,

says that he and his staff also learn a great deal from the students. Several students, upon graduation, have been employed by KCC.

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




#### Residents




#### Meet Kathleen (Kathy) Giedzinski

## **New Arboretum Fund Beautifies KCC's Campuses**

When you think of stewardship, you may think of protecting the environment or you may think of managing financial resources. The Kendal-Crosslands Arboretum Fund epitomizes both types of stewardship. In February 2013, KCC's campus was accredited as an arboretum that includes hundreds of mature trees. In March 2014, the Arboretum Fund was created to accept charitable donations.

Gifts to the Fund support acquisition and care of new trees, and gifts of all sizes are appreciated and are tax-deductible to the full extent of the law. For a donation of \$500 or more, a tree can be planted in honor or memory of a loved one. Kendal-Crosslands Arboretum Committee members are pleased to work with anyone interested in donating a tree and to help you select from a variety of trees on the committee's wish list that includes native species likely to add variety to the arboretum. The names of those honored may appear on a tree label, and a notation of all gifts will be made in the Tree Gift Book in the libraries at Kendal at Longwood and Crosslands.

Philanthropy has a long history at KCC, and now a dedicated staff member manages the organization's fundraising efforts. Stephanie Cory joined the organization as Director of Philanthropy in July.
