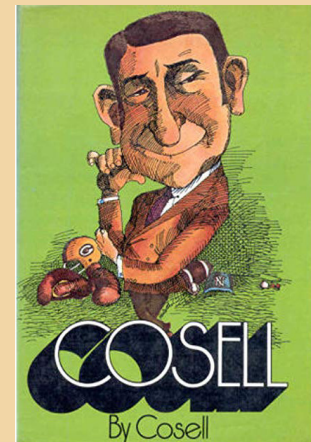

## From the Library: *Cosell* by Howard Cosell

A quote from this autobiography is featured on the flyleaf: “Arrogant, pompous, obnoxious, vain, cruel, verbose, a showoff. I have been called all of these. Of course, I am.”

The flyleaf so intrigued me that I had to read the rest of it—and the book itself. Although I'm not particularly a sports fan, I had heard of him and probably had heard him, as he was a long-time television sportscaster. The football field, the boxing ring, the basketball arena, the 1972 Olympics, “Monday Night

Football”—he was everywhere, befriending the athletes, reporting the athletic events as they occurred, writing and talking about and helping some of the greatest sports heroes of his day. He made his own many, many fans with his superb knowledge of the sports he spoke and wrote about.

Cosell died on April 23, 1995.

And to quote again from the flyleaf, “his autobiography will rank among the best sports books of our time.”

## Warner Hall, Classical Music Disc Jockey

Each Tuesday evening Warner Hall takes a 50-minute drive to the studio of WCPE, the Raleigh area's nonprofit and independent classical music station. He has served as a volunteer announcer there for nearly 25 years.

Warner's main job is to present what he calls the "intros" and "outros"—that is, to inform people just what piece they are about to hear (or have just heard), who wrote it, and who performs it. During his 7-to-10 pm time slot, however, he is "announcer, receptionist, and engineer," fielding phone calls while making sure his "patter" fits into the station's precise time restrictions. "You can't just sit back and enjoy the music," he comments.

While the playlist is pre-selected, Warner can choose and present one classical piece every Tuesday. Often, he chooses an historical event. For example, on the anniversary of Anne Boleyn's execution, he chose (sardonically) the "March to the Scaffold" from Berlioz' *Symphonie Fantastique*.
