All About May

MAY IS THE FIFTH MONTH OF THE YEAR ON THE GREGORIAN CALENDAR and one of seven Gregorian months with 31 days. May is a special month for just about every culture. For Roman Catholics, it is the month to honor the Virgin Mary; for Buddhists, it marks the Buddha's enlightenment; for early pagan cultures, May was the time to celebrate fertility and abundance as a tribute to the month's namesake, Maia, goddess of the life cycle.

BIRTHSTONE – EMERALD

The emerald is the birthstone for May. This stone's name was derived from the Greek word smaragdos, which is a general term that was applied to several kinds of green stones. In the Middle Ages, it was believed that the stone held the power to foretell the future. It was also believed to cure epilepsy and fever and to protect the wearer from panic. Furthermore, Aristotle thought emeralds soothed eyesight.

Emeralds frequently occur inside shale, a fine-grained sedimentary rock. They have been found in Brazil, Pakistan, Norway, Austria, Zambia, India, and Australia. Some are even found in North Carolina. However, Colombia is known to mine the largest and highest quality emeralds, and is the home of the most famous emerald mine. This mine is named Muzo, after the Muzo Indians, who were the original discoverers of the mine.

The flower's Latin name, Convallaria majalis, means "valley" (Convallaria) and "the month of May" (majalis), which probably refers to where it thrives and when it blooms.

These delicate, white, bell-shaped perennials are very fragrant. They signify purity and innocence, and also are said to bring luck in love. For these reasons, they are often the choice for bridal bouquets. When you give these pretty little lilies as a gift, you are saying, "I am humbled by my love for you" or "You've made my life complete." Either way, it's a lucky lady who receives a bouquet of lily of the valley from her sweetheart.



A RAINBOW IS CIRCULAR...

Three things must happen for you to see a rainbow's colors. First, the sun must be shining. Second, the sun must be behind you, and third, there must be water drops in the air in front of you. Sunlight shines into the water drops, which act as tiny prisms that bend or "refract" the light and separate it into colors.

Each drop reflects only one color of light, so there must be many water drops to make a full rainbow. You'll see the brightest rainbows when the water drops are large, usually right after a rain shower.



The rainbow is circular because when a

raindrop bends light, the light exits the raindrop at an angle 40 to 42 degrees away from the angle it entered the raindrop.


But if the sun is very low in the sky, either just before sunset or just after sunrise, we can see a half circle. The higher the sun is in the sky, the less we see of the rainbow.

The only way to see the Full Circle of a Rainbow in the sky is to be above the raindrops and have the sun behind you. You would have to look down on the drops from an airplane. (according to Physics.com)

Now about those RAINDROPS...

As the United States Geographical Survey website notes, raindrops are shaped more like hamburger buns or beans. When they get really large, they split in two. Only then do they turn into a teardrop shape - only to quickly become burger buns again.

Making the cabinet great again

As I thought back to my youth I realized how important the President's cabinet was. I knew Cordell hull was secretary of State, Henry Morgenthau, of Treasury, Harry Hopkin of labor all with high visibility as the cabinet then was much smaller than the present one. So, I began to research the cabinet authorized under Section II, Article 2 of the Constitution, to consult and advise the president in their responsibilities. I discovered there are now 22 members confirmed by the Senate and 10 special assistants appointed by the President which comprise the cabinet. Of those confirmed, three were women, one being Asiatic. one Hispanic ad one being Black. The percentage of white male's appointees is the highest since the Reagan administration. Of the ten special assistants appointed one was female, the remaining nine white males. The profile of this cabinet revealed 'an age range of 45 through 80 and an average age of 57.1, all save one (independent) Republicans, although some had been Democrats before. The composite net wealth of this cabinet was estimated to be 4.3 Billion far above any prior cabinet of record.

With this as a background it seems incongruous that a group who have achieved recognition and wealth in their varied careers, and now on stage with major responsibilities would go virtually unnoticed in the hub of our mighty democracy. , Unreal excepting for one factor, which has altered the normal chemistry of our governmental machinery, and that factor is referred to by the media as POTUS, also known as President Trump. This president has insistently proclaimed himself as a genius, with unmatched skills and knowledge and has received from the cabinet nothing less than genuflection. In fact, he has proclaimed himself singularly equipped in governmental functions including budget, foreign relations domestic issues military affairs, labor and management, issues, racial relations, Constitutional and congressional relations (and public relations) and maybe even putting out the trash each night, and more. abduction and abuse was brought to the public's attention after several instances of highly publicized

5000 volunteers placed flowers on 20,000 Union and Confederate soldier's graves in Arlington National Cemetery. In 1968 the Federal government moved the observance to the last Monday in May, making it a Federal holiday under the movement to provide three day weekends for Federal Employees. Waterloo, New York, was chosen from among the 20 towns holding ceremonies to be designated as the official birthplace of the holiday.

Over the years, there has been some contention arising over the changing of the date to the last Monday of May as it has now become the unofficial beginning of summer activities, with some feeling it is taking away the emphasis on the real meaning of the day.

Begun as a day to honor Union soldiers, some southern States decided to also still honor the birthday of Confederate President Jefferson Davis even though Memorial Day is now designated as a day to recall the fallen of all our wars. Solemn ceremonies parades, picnics and fireworks fill the day.

In the year 2000 a movement was begun to ask all citizens to observe a moment of silence at 3PM in memory of the fallen servicemen and women in all our wars. *Can we at Paul's Run take one moment on May 28th, 2018 to honor their memories?*

UNSUNG HEROINS

This month, instead of outlining the specific contributions that a single woman made to society, I am going to write about the many women, unknown in name, who labored tirelessly for the organization called the Sanitary Commission during the American Civil War.

In a day when women could not enlist in the armed forces, in numerous towns and cities the women banded together into Soldier's Aid Societies to help the war effort by furnishing lint, bandages, hospital clothing and food delicacies not provided by the government. Lint was needed for the packing of wounds and the women took knives, laid cloth on a flat surface and scraped off the excess lint, a very laborious task. Despite their earnest efforts to assist, some rigid (male) members of the Medical Bureau of the War Department turned a cold shoulder to this aid, but on May 18, 1861, the Secretary of War realized the propriety of creating a group to organize these efforts and work with the Medical Bureau.

President Lincoln and the Secretary of War then gave permission to form the Sanitary Commission with its headquarters to be here in Philadelphia at 1307 Chestnut Street.



Funds had to be raised and wealthy men and insurance companies were approached for money. They divided the organization into three committees. The members of these committees did not receive any compensation but they did have to procure some paid workers to handle part of the work..

The first Committee, the Medical committee, sent medical inspectors who watched for perils from climate, malaria, or inadequate food.

The second Committee was for General Relief supplying clothing, hospital furniture and delicacies for the sick in the field, camp or

general hospitals. Many of the soldiers had to forage for supplements to their diet of hardtack and bacon. This committee was supported largely by the volunteer women in Ladies Aid Societies and Relief Associations.

Third was the Committee for Special Relief. They furnished homes to men on sick leave, to those traveling or just discharged from hospitals. They rendered assistance with receiving pensions, bounties and back pay and made up directories listing the names of all soldiers in U.S.. hospitals or any other hospitals in the area, furnishing families and friends with this information. Anxious families who had not heard anything about their loved ones were able to receive valuable information. Raising \$30,000 for supplies, they did their best to send the supplies to captives in Confederate prison camps, sometimes doing so under enemy fire as they attempted to deliver the food or clothing.

These committees were largely headed by men, but the unpaid women were the backbone of the organizations with their skill at raising funds and providing clothing and food. Another group of women, the Hebrew Association for the Relief of the Sick and Wounded assisted the efforts of the Sanitary Commission.




