They have traveled all over the world, but, they agree that there is nothing better than North Carolina.

"Our kids feel good that we are here," said Pat. Their six grandkids love the indoor pool and playground. "This is a really neat place," adds Richard. "Bill Johnson and the staff are terrific." Memoir Class to Publish Year-End Book



"We write on all sorts of topics," said Turner, a freelance writer. "Some of the prompts are seasonal: What's your favorite Christmas memory? What's your favorite Fourth of July memory? 

Dec. 31: New Year's Eve Residents ring in the New Year.




