I would like to share this story in honor of my late father, who would have been 100 years old this month.

"Love is patient, love is kind...it always hopes, always perseveres." 1 Corinthians 13:4,7

My mother met a young lieutenant name George Dexter Grant when she was at Camp Claiborne, in 1941. They were both there for the "Louisiana Maneuvers" the largest military exercise that had ever been held until that time. Dad was from a rural area in Upstate New York, a far cry from where my mother was raised in Uptown New Orleans.

My mother and father knew each other only few weeks before the time came for them to be shipped overseas. Dad wanted to get engaged, but Mom wanted to wait, she said that the future was just too uncertain. They promised to write one another.

Dad was sent to the Aleutian Islands of Alaska, and Mom was sent Australia & New Guinea. Mom said she and the other nurses had a great time overseas. After all, there were just a few women among thousands of men. My mother told me, "I fell in and out of love every week or so… never seriously…" she smiled. "But those letters from your father kept coming, and in between, I'd always come back those letters."

As the war was ending in 1945, they both got shipped back stateside. Mom decided that even though it had been over 3 years since they had seen each other, she owed it to herself to see Dad again. They arranged to meet in San Francisco. Six weeks later Mom and Dad were married. Though they had their share of difficulties, I believe that they were happy.

I admire the way my father kept sending those letters. Dad was fortunate. From what I've seen, sometimes things never work out, no matter how hard one of the people tries. But I'm thankful that my father did persevere. In the end, his persevering love for my mother, worked out well for all concerned. (especially for me and my brothers and sisters).

In my life, I realize that there were many years that I frittered away my time with other things and didn't think about my relationship with God. But as I look back, I can see that there was a steady stream of opportunities that God sent my way. Like a stack of unopened letters... they were invitations to develop a life-changing, personal relationship with Him. What an Awesome God. I wasn't thinking about Him, yet He never gave up on me.

British composer Adam Gorb's Adrenaline City Overture is inspired by twenty-first century life in London, both stressful and vibrant, while Aaron Copland's Quiet City displays the moments of solitude and quiet that inhabitants are capable of stealing away during a late night in the city.



MARINE CHAMBER ORCHESTRA CONCERT

With his First Symphony, Ludwig van Beethoven established himself as the heir of the Classical symphony. This bold offering made clear the composer's adventurous appetite to expand and develop the genre, taking it to heights never before imagined. The program will also feature Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's Sinfonia Concertante for oboe, clarinet, horn, and bassoon, as well as Felix Mendelssohn's mysterious and captivating Hebrides Overture, also known as "Fingal's Cave."
