The Home Receives "Deficiency-Free" Rating

hanks to the constant efforts of our staff, the Home began the year 2018 with a "Deficiency-Free" rating from the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services (NJDHSS).

The rating is the highest awarded by NJDHSS and comes following an unannounced, on-site inspection primarily evaluating our Mountain View Skilled Nursing Unit. The survey provides a comprehensive assessment of the Home's compliance with numerous state standards in every area of operation — including care provided, condition of the building and grounds, integrity of record-keeping procedures and more.

The deficiency-free rating represents an exceptional

DEFICIENCY FREE level of care. From 2010 through 2014, 16 percent or fewer New Jersey skilled nursing facilities the size of the Home's (50-99 beds) achieved deficiencyfree ratings according to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services' 2015 Nursing Home Data Compendium, the most recent available. Fewer than 14 percent of all nursing homes in the state achieved similar results.

"This is proof of the incredible work our staff does yearround," says Executive Director/Administrator Carlos G. Beato. "Their dedication to our residents makes our Home extraordinary, and we can all be proud of the excellent care that this rating indicates."

As a certified Continuing Care Retirement Community, the Holland Christian Home offers three levels of care — Independent Living, Supportive Care and Skilled Nursing all in the same facility as part of our Life Care program. Our Mountain View Skilled Nursing wing includes 52 beds and is fully staffed with 24/7 medical care. With over 150 total staff, the Home is dedicated to meeting the highest standards so that our residents can enjoy physically, spiritually and emotionally fulfilling lives.

J esus told this parable: "Therefore everyone who hears these words of mine and puts them into practice is like a wise man who built his house on the rock. The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house; yet it did not fall, because it had its foundation on the rock" (Matthew 7:24-25).

I sometimes wonder how we can be more like the wise man and build on the solid foundation God has granted the Holland Christian Home. We are certainly excited about expanding our physical facility to renovate Mountain View Skilled Nursing Unit and create a new memory-care wing. These are amazing culminations of the wonderful resources and hard-working staff we are blessed with.

But God has also blessed us in other ways so that we might grow in service to Him. "For everyone to whom much is given, from him much will be required" (Luke 12:48). How has God blessed us in order that we might bless others more? One of the pillars of God's work at the Home is our close-knit community. The relationships among our residents and staff — as well as with their friends, families and church communities — are unique among retirement facilities. We want

Then Kathy Tanis decided to close the last chapter of her career at the Holland Christian Home, she found herself reflecting on the first. It began like many others. Arriving in 1997, she took a job as a night nurse. Over time, she advanced into an MDS role (in which she was responsible for patient assessments) and eventually became Assistant Director of Nursing.

That's almost where things ended, however. Wondering if "the grass was greener," Kathy left the home to take a nursing position elsewhere.

But it wasn't to be. Kathy returned to the Home in 2013 just before the Director of Nursing position opened up. And she was thrilled to step up. Her time away from the Home had made one thing clear to her: "There is NO place like the Holland Home."

As Kathy says this to me, a voice next to her eagerly adds, "I can second that motion!" The voice belongs to Mercy Martin, the Home's new Director of Nursing and Kathy's successor. At the time of our conversation, Mercy had only been at the Home for a couple of weeks but could already sense that the Home is a unique "family unit."

Mercy has seen many health care facilities in her career. Working mostly in New York, she started her young career as a food service worker, eventu-

ally advancing to roles as a Food Service Director, dietitian and nutritionist. As a nurse, Mercy spent time in bedside care and wound care before taking roles as an MDS nurse, Assistant Director of Nursing and Director of Nursing. She even spent time as an Administrator.

Her diverse experience makes her sensitive to the unique challenges different departments face. "I understand what each department goes through."

For Mercy, arriving at the Home is a bit of a homecoming in more ways than one: while it's a return to nursing, it's also a return to her own linguistic roots. That's because Mercy grew up in Aruba, where the entire educational system was in Dutch. Since her first day at the Home, residents have been delighted to help her practice her Dutch language skills.

"My one philosophy was nobody should die alone."

Kathy insists her retirement was not an easy decision. There is a lot she will miss and was excited about. The Home's recent deficiency-free rating was evidence of the tremendous staff she leaves behind. And she is thrilled that a new memory-care wing is on the way thanks to the official start of construction through the Spirit of Progress Campaign.

Still, she and her husband have travelling to do and grandchildren to enjoy. And after three weeks with Mercy, she knows "the Holland Christian Home is in good hands."

Rev. Dr. Zoltan Kiraly

Rev. Dr. Zoltan Kiraly was born on March 9, 1920, near the border between Hungary and Romania. He finished elementary school and high school in the Romanian city of Oradea (also known as Nagyvarad). He then began studying theology in Debrecen, Hungary's second largest city, and later studied Latin and Hungarian literature. In his early career, he trained under the supervision of a pastor and was also an assistant teacher in commercial and industrial schools.

`Though he enjoyed preaching every Sunday, he soon had to choose between resigning his pastoral role or becoming a Communist Party member. He resigned and moved to Budapest, working in a factory. In 1956 he came to the United States where he learned English and attended Union Theological Seminary in New York City. He began preaching in both Hungarian and English at a church in Yonkers and was eventually called to Manville, New Jersey. After 17 years of service in the Hungarian Reformed Church in Passaic, he retired in Florida.

When his wife of 53 years, Susanne, was called home, some worried about Zoltan living alone. But his son, Zoltan F. Jr., brought him to the Home where "thanks to God and the dedicated services" of the staff he has been gaining strength daily — even preaching in the Home's Sunday Chapel services twice! Christmas cookies with the Ladies Auxiliary and catching a show at Hunterdon Hills Playhouse, there were plenty of birthday and tea parties to enjoy. And when the fun pauses, there are lots of friends to spend time with!

Education Program Helps Staff Thrive

ver the past year, the Holland Christian Home has benefitted from an exceptional education program thanks to a grant awarded by the New Jersey Department of Labor and obtained in conjunction with William Paterson University and TNT Educational Services. This grant partnered the Home with a professional educator, Lucy Sherman, CDP. With her experience in staff and healthcare education, Lucy collaborated with the Home to develop and teach a year-long series of educational seminars.

This kind of series is rare and valuable. Time and resources can limit continuing education to in-services that staff members read and complete independently. Just like in school, however, learning has deeper impacts in a classroom setting.

As an independent contractor, Lucy can focus her time exclusively on that classroom setting. That single-mindedness means each topic is customized specifically for Holland Christian Home employees. Instead of learning about topics in a generalized academic style, staff members think about them in the context of their own daily work. An emergency preparedness lesson, which might usually cover generic scenarios and responses, could now focus on reviewing the roles of individual staff members in a crisis and the names of local emergency officials. While many of the topics have to do with health care, the training benefits employees in every department. In many ways, it is especially important for staff beyond the nursing department to understand health realities in the lives of residents. A housekeeper who understands dementia or an activities assistant who knows how to prevent falls are able to do their jobs more compassionately and comprehensively.

Lucy says there have been many "light bulb moments" when a topic took on new resonance for employees. For example, sessions on memory impairments emphasize the role an employee's body language plays in communicating with residents. It's a bigger role than you might think: 35% of Americans over the age of 65 are foreign-born, and people often revert to their original language as they age. That makes visual communication exceptionally important, especially at a place like the Home with so many foreign roots.

Every class feels designed around the Golden Rule, helping staff imagine themselves as residents and ask "how would I want to be treated?"

Sometimes Lucy even puts her class on the spot through a simulation, prompting employees to respond like they would in real life.

Staff Education continued...

This is the kind of active learning Lucy aims for. "She personalizes it," Director of Social Services Chris Franco says. To that end, Lucy brings another special asset with her: she speaks fluently in both English and Spanish. She will often interact with employees after sessions, using both languages to clarify specific questions in detail.

With so many benefits, it's no surprise that competition for the grant is fierce. In a region as densely populated as New Jersey, there is only so much money to go around for so many applicants.

That's why facilities are not permitted to receive the grant in two consecutive years. For the Home, that means the grant ended in January.

Nevertheless, thanks to Lucy's instruction the Home has a more robust staff and a proven framework for excellent education in years to come.
