Jay's Desk

January 2019

Happy New Year to each of you and trusting that the good memories of Christmas are still fresh in your minds and hearts. We look forward to ringing in the New Year with our residents in Dole Hall on December 31st, making good use of the new dance floor!

It was an outstanding 2018 for Plymouth Place, and I want to reflect for a moment before we press on to 2019. Highlighting a few successes:

We were able to complete a number of large capital projects that improved décor, service, and ambience for our residents; specifically, renovations included our memory neighborhood – Greg's Place, our healthcare north and south common spaces, and our main lobby. Numerous residents generously gave monies to support our capital projects, thus enhancing the overall project with additional amenities and services.

Our gracious residents and friends of Plymouth Place raised over \$90,000 to invest back into the education and development of our staff through the scholarship fund. Furthermore, the residents and families of Plymouth Place gave more than \$240,000 for our employee Christmas fund, providing an incredible gift in advance of Christmas for our associates.

We have implemented a number of leadership changes to support our community's future and provide long-term sustainability, as well as programmatic improvements to better serve our residents.

The team achieved 100% occupancy in assisted living, memory care, and record census levels in healthcare and independent living. The last quarter was especially strong with 2018 being a banner year for revenue.

Another year of award-winning programs and services that have enhanced the lives of seniors at Plymouth Place and in the greater community.

Strong partnerships with 17 other non-profit organizations that make a difference in the lives of our neighbors and support our social accountability role within the greater community.

Financial indicators are strong as we have exceeded the bondholders' requirements for debt service coverage, days cash on hand, and budgeted net income. These achievements resulted in the lowest annual increase in 10 years for Plymouth Place customers.

These results could only be achieved through a tremendous team effort with residents, staff, leadership and our Board. What a great testament to our community and the collaboration and trust that exist to support a greater good.


