Since his retirement from full-time teaching in 2010, he has served on the board of the Baltimore Immigration Museum, which opened in May 2016, chronicling the story of Baltimore's immigration. He has also lectured at a variety of senior citizen facilities, and civic organizations and clubs.

Shuttle to Safeway Pharmacy for Pneumonia and/or Shingles vaccine

There will be a shuttle trip on the afternoon Wednesday, December 6 to Safeway Pharmacy for those residents interested in getting their pneumonia and/or shingles vaccination. Please make sure if you are interested in going that you sign up in the activity sign up book in advance and indicate which vaccinations you would like to get. You will need to bring your Medicare and insurance cards with you to Safeway, you do not need a doctor's order or medical records to get your vaccination. The pneumonia vaccines are billed to Medicare, however, the shingles vaccine is billed to part D insurances so you may have a copay. The pharmacist will be able to advise you regarding which vaccinations you qualify for. If you have any questions regarding receiving vaccinations call the Safeway pharmacist at 410-296-4491 or speak with your healthcare provider. There are vaccine consent forms available in the medical suite available for you to fill out in advance or you can obtain and fill out a consent form at Safeway when you go to get your vaccine.



Baltimore Council on Foreign Affairs

The Baltimore Council on Foreign Affairs has invited Matthew Kroenig, Ph.D., to present The Case for Trump's Foreign Policy at the World Trade Center in Baltimore on Wednesday, December 6. The Baltimore Council on Foreign Affairs has long been committed to trying to articulate the theory, principles, and policies of our incumbent administrations so that analyses of them are made easier and better grounded. In that spirit, the Council is especially pleased to welcome Matthew Kroenig whose view of the Trump foreign policy recently appeared in *Foreign Affairs*.

Professor Kroenig is the author, coauthor, and co-editor of five books on nuclear proliferation. His numerous peer-reviewed articles have covered international relations and foreign policy including Europe, Asia, the Middle East, nuclear deterrents and nonproliferation, terrorism, soft power, and democracy.

BMA: Tomás Saraceno: Entangled Orbits



Internationally acclaimed artist and trained architect Tomás Saraceno (b. 1973, Argentina) created a breathtaking, site-specific work commissioned by the Baltimore Museum of Art for its East Lobby. Suspended in the air two stories high, the new sculpture, which also lends its name to an expanded exhibition of Saraceno's work in the Museum, is

comprised of clusters of iridescent-paneled modules held in place by a net of strings reminiscent of a spider web. Appearing somewhat like bubbles, these spherical modules evoke the artist's visionary plans for "cloud cities," which look to naturally occurring forms for inspiration and might provide environments for future human habitation. Similarly, the intricate spider web of ropes refers to a natural structure that encompasses the qualities of strength, beauty, and flexibility.

Enjoy a guided tour on Thursday, December 7. Residents will have extra time after our tour to explore the museum. The bus will depart at 9:30 and return by 1:00. Christmas Magic- A Festival of Lights

Christmas Magic is in its 33rd year. In 1984 a small budget allowed for 10,000



lights and props, most produced by the Parks Department. Today, the props are produced commercially and "in-house." This is the largest program presented by the York County Department of Parks and Recreation each year. Christmas Magic is a 1/2 mile ADA-accessible walking trail (accessible to anyone) that meanders along a wooded hilltop through nearly 600,000 Christmas lights, holiday scenes and five enclosed heated pavilions. The spirit of the holiday is displayed by using animation, displays, Santa Claus, food

and a G-gauge train display. Two separate trips will be offered, the first on Monday, December 11 and the second on Tuesday, December 19.

National Gallery of Art

The introduction of quiet scenes unfolding in private household spaces and featuring elegant ladies and gentlemen was among the most striking innovations of Dutch painting of the Golden Age, a time of unparalleled innovation and prosperity. The exhibition brings together nearly 70 works by Vermeer and his fellow painters, see it for yourself on Thursday, January 4. The exhibition features 10 paintings by Vermeer many of which have not been seen in the United States since the Gallery's 1995–1996 exhibition.


Let's Write!
