Editorials: How They're Born

Andrew Green, the editor of the Baltimore Sun's editorial page, will speak at Edenwald on **Monday, January 7**. He will speak on Editorials: How They're Born in the Auditorium between 7:30 and 8:30.

Before he became editorial page editor, Mr. Green served as The Sun's City/State editor. He oversaw coverage and wrote about state and local politics, crime, courts, education, and the environment. Before coming to the Sun in 2001, he was a general assignment reporter for The Arkansas Democrat-Gazette. In 2001, he was a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in editorial writing.

While a reporter in Annapolis, he wrote a paragraph, later called "A #MeToo Moment," that gained him national fame. The paragraph went like this: "I was standing in the Governor's Reception Room on the second floor of the State House on Feb. 15, 2006 when then-Comptroller William Donald Schaefer asked for a cup of tea. A young woman who worked for then-Governor Robert L Ehrlich, Jr. set it down in front of him and wordlessly headed back to the side of the room as Schaefer followed with his eyes.

He asked her to come back. She did. 'Walk again,' he said, before giving an exaggerated leer at her backside as she fled from the room."

Among the topics Mr. Green will touch on in his talk are: How do you determine what to write an editorial about?

How do you determine what position to take? When do you yourself write the editorial and when do you ask someone else to write it? Where do you find the editorials you admire the most? If I'd like my granddaughter to become an editorial writer what should I recommend to her?

Pride of Baltimore II



Edenforum is pleased to welcome Captain Jan Miles on **Wednesday**, **January 9** at 7:30 in the Auditorium.

The reconstructed tall ship, the Pride of Baltimore II is a well recognized and respected American sailing vessel. It is unique for finding speed and agility under sail in its international voyages. The original Pride of Baltimore was

used as a privateer in the War of 1812 with England. It captured more English commercial sailing vessels than any other American ship. Pride II sailed in our modern era as a promotional ambassador of Baltimore and Maryland. Captain Miles will bring insight into some of the most fascinating voyages of the Pride.

Captain Miles started serious sailing in his teen years in Annapolis. When not attending high school he worked as crew of small vessels on voyages ranging from Nova Scotia to Panama plus the West Coast of Central America. He became certified by the United States Coast Guard as a captain of small vessels at the minimum allowed age of 18. From his early twenties on, he has been a maritime professional with a focus in traditionally rigged sailing vessels. He has captained voyages from Northern and Southern Europe to Eastern Asia and the coasts of the United States including the Great Lakes. He is Senior Captain for the non-profit company managing Marylander's Sailing Ambassador. He has been captain for the world wide renowned voyages of Maryland's Pride of Baltimore II since 1981.

Aaron Copland: Dean of American Composers

Edenforum is pleased to welcome Seth Kibel on **Wednesday**, **January 16** at 7:30 in the Auditorium.




The 1940s output of Aaron Copland is some of the most "American- sounding" work in the entirety of the classical oeuvre. Is this because Copland, the son of Jewish immigrants, was able to capture the inexorable energy of the American republic in his work, or was it just the popularity and accessibility of his work that allowed it to fill a

void in the public imagination? In any case, the works Copland produced during this decade, from Appalachian Spring to Fanfare for The Common Man to Rodeo, have become touchstones for American classical music, earning him the sobriquet of "Dean of American Composers." These compositions and more will be examined and discussed in this presentation, with recordings, video excerpts, and maybe even a bit of live performance from the instructor himself.

Seth is one of the Mid-Atlantic's premier woodwind specialists, working with some of the best bands in jazz, swing, and more. Wowing audiences on saxophone, clarinet, and flute, Seth has made a name for himself in the Washington/Baltimore region, and beyond. He is the featured performer with The Alexandria Kleztet, Bay Jazz Project, Music Pilgrim Trio, The Natty Beaux, and more.

Inuit Art: Hidden Treasures

Edenforum is most fortunate to have with us on **Monday, January 21** at 7:30 in the Auditorium Dr. Joram Piatigorsky.





Piatigorsky, "I first saw Alaskan and Inuit sculptures thirty years ago in the display window of the Alaskan Shop in Vail. Most were carved from veined shades of green serpentine, black stones, and softer steatite (soapstone); a few were made from walrus tusk, caribou antler, muskox horn, whalebone, white marble and imported Brazilian soapstone. I'd never seen anything like it and ambled into the gallery. The pieces danced as if alive before my

eyes." His son gave him a piece of the Inuit sculpture for his 50th birthday and he has been studying the Inuit and collecting their art ever since. To further quote Dr. Piatigorsky, "Inuit art is about hidden gems in the shadows of an obscure, ancient world. I hope that it will capture you with the intensity that it did me."

After graduating from Harvard College (1962) and receiving his Ph.D. degree from the California Institute of Technology (1967), Joram Piatigorsky conducted research at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda. He established the Laboratory of Molecular and Developmental Biology in the National Eye Institute in 1981 and was its Chief until 2009, when he became an Emeritus Scientist.

age of 10 to the mountainous western part of the state to Flathead Lake where he grew up. He attended primary school in the Lake Town of Somers.

then high school in nearby Kalispell. In his senior year Le participated in a church youth group where his advisor suggested he enter the ministry, which he did.

Le began attending a Lutheran College in St. Olaf, Minnesota. After graduating he participated in an exchange teacher program, and taught English for a year in the Martin Schule in Rimbach, Germany. Returning to the seminary for his final year, Le, still single learned how to play guitar to meet girls. He met his future wife, Teddi Gulhagen, for the first time at a Christmas party. The two met

a second time at tryouts for an amateur theatre group in which they were cast as lovers. Six months later they married.

Teddi worked at McMillan Publishing while Le graduated with his Master's and then on to receive his Ph.D. In 1970 believing his dissertation was nearly completed Le took a teaching position overseas at the Pacific Theological Seminary, in the Fiji Islands. The Mebust family also grew during this time (Kai, Aaron, Daniel, Siri, and Diane). The family lived in Fiji for 8 years. In 1999 Teddi suffered a stroke leaving her paralyzed, and passing away 2 years later. At this point Ascension Lutheran Church in Towson was looking for a new pastor and called Le. He served for 13 years and retired in 2005.

Le enjoys his family, four surviving children, 12 grandchildren and 7 great grandchildren. He enjoys his stay at Edenwald, and looks forward to making many new friends.

Carmen is an opera in four acts by French composer Georges Bizet. The libretto was written by Henri Meilhac and Ludovic Halévy, based on a novella of the same title by Prosper Mérimée. The opera was first performed by the

Opéra-Comique in Paris on March 3, 1875, where its breaking of conventions shocked and scandalized its first audiences.

Bizet died suddenly after the 33rd performance, unaware that the work would achieve international acclaim within the following ten years. Carmen has since become one of the most popular and frequently performed operas in the classical canon; the "Habanera" from act 1 and the "Toreador Song" from act 2 are among the best known of all operatic arias.

The Book Club will meet on Tuesday, January 8, at 7:30 in the private dining room on the second floor.




