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The Language of Flowers

In 1988 the American Wildflower Society held their first National Wildflower Week. The Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center overseas the annual event each year. This year National Wildflower Week falls from May 1st to the 7th. The aim of National Wildflower Week is to encourage public awareness in the protection of wildflowers against extinction, and the invasion of non-native invasive plants.

Wildflowers have an important role in the environment. They help to conserve water, prevent soil erosion, provide habitat and food for birds, bees, and butterflies. Allowing wildflowers to grow along highways and on public lands reduces landscaping costs and creates panoramic sense of beauty.

The "Texas Highways Magazine" published photos of


A Reminder To The Residents



They used a system called selam, which was a system of memorization. Selam uses rhymes corresponding to the name of the flower. An example would be; the word for "pear" is "armonde", which rhymes with "omonde" meaning hope. "Armonde wer banna bir omonde" translates to "pear let me not despair". We must look to the Victorians to learn the wonderful language and symbolism of wildflowers. Lady Mary Wortley Montague is one person who is credited with introducing the language of flowers to the Victorians. Her husband began a career as Ambassador to Turkey in 1717. While in Turkey, Lady Montague was able to study and write about her experience in Turkey.

During medieval times people carried fragrant nosegays called "tussie-mussies" to protect themselves from bad smells. During this time period bad smells were linked to diseases and good smells were linked to good health. During the reign of

Queen Victoria (1837-1901) knowledge of the floral arts were a part of every lady's education. Finishing schools offered instruction in botany and the language of flowers. Each flower, herb, tree, and shrub had a meaning. Young ladies were also taught the art of making tussie-mussies. A tussiemussie means a spray, nosegay, or garland of flowers. A tussie means a knot of flowers, and a

mussie refers to the moss wrapped around the stems to keep them moist. As many Victorians could not read or write flowers were used to communicate feelings and send messages. There are hundreds of flowers with their own specific meanings. PMJ


Resident of the Month Noella Laflamme

Prettiest Places In The World To See Wild Flowers

Kawachi Fujien, Japan - With 20 species at last count, Japan is no stranger to the wisteria plant. The best places to catch them is Kawachi Fujien garden's two wisteria tunnels—one more than 260 feet long and the other an incredible 720 feet long. May is the best time to see these flowering plants cascading down the sides of the tunnels in full radiant bloom.



Antelope Valley, California - The rolling landscape of California bursts with color every spring as the state flower, the poppy, sprouts up along highways. The Antelope Valley California Poppy Reserve, located in northern Los Angeles County, boasts more than 1,740 acres of land covered with bright orange poppies (the most consistent blooms of the flower in the entire state). These beauties are up from March through May.

Great Smokey Mountains National Park, U.S.A - Nicknamed Wildflower National Park, this is a preserve of wildflower diversity—showcasing more types of flowering plants (at last count 1,500) than any other North American national park. Although blooming flowers can be seen year-round, each year the park hosts a Spring Wildflower Pilgrimage, a week-long festival of guided walks and hikes.



Namaqualand, South Africa - If you're planning summer or fall travel, you're in luck. The indigenous plants along the Wildflower Route in South Africa start blooming in early August and dot the landscape with an array of colors (in the form of 3,500 floral varieties) through the end of September. Just as the spring flowers begin to die back, another round

of beautiful autumn blooms starts to sprout.

Hill County, Texas - Although the peak-viewing season for these bluebonnets is late April, the fields do not lose any color as the season progresses. Texas Paintbrush and Indian Blanket, followed by Winecup and Square-Bud Primrose wildflowers, start appearing through the brush as the bluebonnets fade away.





Valley of Roses, Bulgaria - The valley happens to be one of the biggest producers of rose oil in the world. (The climate is near perfection for the proper cultivation of this delicate flower.) Buds begin to bloom in mid-March and remain in full effect throughout the summer months, thanks to heavy rainfalls in the region that help prolong the flowering period.

Provence, France - Every August, the village of Sault hosts Lavender Day—a festival celebrating the official flower of Provence. Festivities begin with a harvest competition, followed by a lavender growers' market.






Tuscany, Italy - Sunflowers flow throughout the fields of Tuscany from mid-June to early August for the past 300 years. These giants go by the name girasole, meaning sun-turner in Italian, because they move to face the sun throughout the day, starting by pointing east in the morning and finishing by facing west in the evening.


