LESSON LEARNED

A Closer Look At Your Power Of Attorney

The Uniform Power of Attorney Act (UPOAA) provides a simple way for people to deal with their property by providing a power of attorney in case of future incapacity. While chiefly a set of default rules, the act also contains safeguards for the protection of an incapacitated principal. In other words, UPOAA enhances the effectiveness of a power of attorney, and helps prevent, identify and redress the abuse or misuse of a power of attorney by an agent.

Pop quiz time! Answer the questions below to familiarize yourself with and to ensure you're protected by the Uniform Power of Attorney Act (UPOAA):

- Have you ever executed a general power of attorney (financial)?
- Do you know where the 'original' version of your power of attorney document is?
- Did you execute a power of attorney in the state where you currently reside?
- Are the individuals named in a power of attorney still alive, competent, and the ones you want to act on your behalf?
- Do you know if your power of attorney is durable (survives your incapacity/incompetency), is springing (requires an event to take place to become effective), allows gifting (restricted or unrestricted), and is compliant with the adoption of the UPOAA by North Carolina?

If you answered "no" to one or more of these questions, consider obtaining a new durable general power of attorney (financial) from a competent Estate Planning or Elder Law attorney. Beware of using a free online form. It's best to be cautious when granting someone else financial and legal control over yourself. Plus, you may mistakenly use an out-of-date form made useless by UPOAA.

Butterflies, one of Nature's Miracles

Back in 1995, Peggy Baird noticed that worms were eating her potted plants. Turns



out, these worms weren't worms at all – they were Easter Black Swallowtail butterflies. And the rest is history. She's

been raising butterflies ever since.

She moves them to a jar and feeds them until they turn into a chrysalis. For 9 to 12 days, the chrysalis is attached to the side of



the jar before hatching into a butterfly.

This year, she started with 28 monarch larvae and 20 hatched!
