Here Comes the Holiday Season!



As another busy Woodland Pond year draws to a close it is time to send it off with a full, exciting holiday season. We will celebrate in festive fashion with many special events offered for your enjoyment. Please keep this page of your newsletter handy throughout the month to refer to frequently so that you don't miss any of these special opportunities!

We will officially kick off the season with the Annual Tree Lighting in the Lobby on Wednesday, Dec. 5 at 3 p.m., as we gather around the fireplace to admire the tree, enjoy Yuletide carols, hot chocolate and cookies.

This year Hanukkah begins at sundown on **Sunday, Dec. 2 to Sunday, Dec. 9.** Please note that we are making a change in location for the nightly lighting of the menorah to the <u>Classroom at 4:30 p.m.</u> each evening during Hanukkah to better accommodate attendance. Rabbis and residents will offer prayers, songs and stories for the nightly observance. There will be a Hanukkah party on **Tuesday, Dec. 4 at 3:30 p.m.** in the Game Room.

The Pondaliers are busily rehearsing for their annual holiday concert with this year's theme ~ Songs of Good Cheer. Three performances are planned to accommodate the large audiences expected: Monday, Dec. 10 at 3:30 p.m. in the Health Center's Great Room, then two performances in the Performing Arts Center on Wednesday, Dec. 12 at 7:30 p.m. and Friday, Dec. 14 at 3:30 p.m. PAC seating is limited: please sign up at the Concierge desk for the performance you plan to attend.

Not to be missed is a special Woodland Pond holiday tradition, Roger Leonard's one-man rendition of Charles Dickens' classic, *A Christmas Carol*. He will perform it on **Tuesday**, **Dec. 18 at 3:00 p.m.** in the Performing Arts Center. From Woodland Pond's Board of Directors



For the benefit of residents who did not hear my report on the Leading Age National Conference, here is a brief


summary of what I experienced over the four days of the conference. A continuous theme running through all the sessions I attended, focusing on the future health of CCRCs, was that change was essential for communities like Woodland Pond to continue to attract younger residents, the Baby Boomers, whose interests, outlooks and expectations, according to national surveys, differ significantly from those of current occupants.

In all the areas where change was recommended, I took note with both pleasure and pride of how Woodland Pond was already meeting these recommendations and rapidly changing in both big and small ways: vast technology changes including our becoming part of Connected Living and our new technologically advanced classroom and the computerized system for servers to place luncheon and dinner orders; our power station for electric cars; the installation of LED lighting around the campus; recycling and composting improvements; new day-long food service in the Pub; ongoing resident input on dining choices, with a very active, resident-led Dining Committee; a shifting kaleidoscope of activities initiated and led by residents; an active and productive Residents' Council; Dedrick's satellite pharmacy on our campus; continuous resident interaction with various agencies in the surrounding area; new contract types for entering Woodland Pond; marketing incentives for occupying units in less desirable locations as well as differentiated pricing for re-occupying units with noted upgrades and premier locations; increased cost of Life Care to offset residents' longer life spans beyond actuarial projections; and the five-year Strategic Plan developed by Michelle and our Board of Directors.

Attending this national conference and learning what is happening across the country with CCRCs gives one an objective perspective on the status of our own beloved Woodland Pond. We are doing very well. Our innovative, forward-looking approaches signify that we are on the cutting edge for attracting future residents and advancing the welfare of our community. Great credit belongs to Michelle, her management team and our marketing department for their creative and skillful leadership.




Another group of young men came in and kept saying "Wow - I can't believe this!" So you can see how much our efforts are appreciated. Thank you!

Ring in the New Year with your Woodland Pond neighbors with an evening of fun and fellowship to welcome in 2019 on **Monday, Dec. 31**.





Wellness Nates

December 2-8 is *National Hand-Washing Awareness Week*. The easy and everyday action of washing your hands is one of the **BEST** ways to avoid getting sick and spreading illness. It doesn't hurt to review these tips:

When to wash your hands:

- * Before and after preparing food
- * Before eating your meals
- * Inserting or removing contact lenses / eye drops
- * Before and after changing a bandage
- * Before and after visiting someone who is sick
- * After touching animals
- * After using the bathroom each time
- * After blowing your nose, coughing or sneezing
- * Any time your hands are visibly dirty or feel sticky

Effective hand washing steps:

- * Wet your hands with running water
- * Apply soap
- * Lather well
- * Rub your hands together for a minimum of 20 seconds (be a kid and sing "Twinkle, Twinkle Little Star" or "The Alphabet Song!")
- * Rub in between all fingers, top of the hand, wrist area and under the fingernails
- * Rinse well let the soap and water run downwards into the sink
- Dry your hands thoroughly with a clean towel, disposable towel or air dryer
- * If possible, use another clean towel to shut off the water faucet

Make washing your hands an active, health habit today and every day. Protect yourself and others. Effective hand hygiene is in our **HANDS**.

Creativity flourishes at Woodland Pond

Meet Your Neighbors ~ Ann and Karl Rodman

Longtime residents of New Paltz, Ann and Karl retired to Sanibel Island, Florida about 10 years ago, and were snowbirds between Florida and their home on Huguenot Street. Karl reflected that "when Hurricane Irene destroyed our home on Huguenot Street, we moved to Florida full-time."

They met as teachers at the New Lincoln School in NYC, married, and moved to Ulster County in 1962 when they opened a children's summer camp. Karl subsequently started a school on the property and Ann renovated an old barn in New Paltz and created the gift shop Handmade & More on North Front Street, which is still flourishing after 42 years. Ann became involved in local politics and was elected the Democratic Chair in New Paltz and Vice Chair in the County. Karl went back to school for his Doctorate in Education, then taught as an adjunct at SUNY New Paltz. He has also published two books. The couple has two children and four grandchildren.

They have been active in their communities. In Sanibel they volunteered at the "Historical Village Museum." Ann learned the art of fused glass and Karl joined a writer's group. It is no surprise that their activism continued when they moved to Woodland Pond in November of 2016. Karl has given two presentations to our community, one on the Hudson River tours which he conducted (an outgrowth of his former tours in Russia) and one on the work he and others did to have a Cold War Museum built at Stewart Airport. He is also a member of the Welcome Committee, responsible for writing profiles for the Resident Directory, a helpful guide to getting to know your neighbors. (If you don't have a profile in the Directory, please contact Karl (845) 419-2583 for an appointment). Most recently, Karl chaired the nominating committee that presented candidates for the Residents' Council.

Ann has a longstanding history as a New Paltz community activist. She and other grassroots organizers were featured in the November 8, 2018 *New Paltz Times* lead article "Green Activism Goes Silver" which describes the group's efforts to preserve New Paltz's small town environment by waging campaigns against what they considered to be irresponsible development. Arguably, their biggest success was to prevent Walmart from opening a store in New Paltz 25 years ago.

Not long after she moved to Woodland Pond Ann broke her ankle and was in our Health Center for nearly six weeks. She was pleased with her care and that motivated her to join the Health Center Committee; she concentrates on the Assisted Living Unit where she is focused on the residents' concerns. She also participated in our *Kaleidoscope of the Arts* for two years — her fused glass earrings were quite a hit! Exercise is important to her; she and Karl walk about two miles each day; she also has a personal trainer in a New Paltz gym.

Reflecting on their life here, Ann states "I loved it instantly, and the honeymoon is not over." What Karl likes most is that we are a "work in progress" in which the residents help shape the future of our community.
