

We further provide a comfortable living environment with amenities comparable to the very finest homes at a competitive rate. Our recent remodel is an example of our commitment to quality. We were able to completely change the exterior and interior appearance of the home without significantly altering the rate structure for our residents.

But most importantly of all, Canton Christian Home provides a community where people of Christian faith can continue to serve and thrive. Our Mission Statement reads "Empowering seniors to live life fully, continue to impact their world and to enjoy the endless adventure of the Christian life." Our residents come to us from a large variety of backgrounds and experiences, and most have a desire to keep in touch with the churches and organizations where they have most recently been serving. Our job is to empower them to stay engaged, because we deeply believe that the Christian life is an endless adventure – beginning now and going forward for eternity.

Sometimes that empowerment means providing support services such as transportation, sometimes healthcare to see someone through health issues, sometimes spiritual services to meet a special need, and sometimes outright financial help to allow them to be a part of this community as long as they need. God has deeply blessed CCH over the years with loving, nurturing care-giving staff and volunteers as well as friends who have provided the financial support to allow us to carry out this mission. INTERESTING FACTS OVER THE FIRST 40 YEARS

- Canton Christian Home opened its doors on November 8, 1976.
- The Home had its 40th anniversary on November 8, 2016.
- The Home has had 1969 different residents over the years.
- God through His church and individual donors has provided over seven million dollars of benevolent subsidy to residents unable to pay their full care costs.
- The Auxiliary has raised over \$1,000,000 in their fundraising efforts for the benefit of the residents.
- The Canton Christian Home currently has 250 residents and employs 225 people.
- The Home has had only three Executive Directors, three Directors of Nursing and two Development Directors in its 40 year history.
- The oldest resident in the Home lived to be 109 years of age.
- Our first Activity Director and now Social Service Worker and Chaplain has now been with Canton Christian Home 40 years.










MEET OUR TWO NEW TRUSTEES
