

Carmelite Palliative Care

At Garvey Manor we have been asked the question-

Do we have Hospice Care? The answer to that is more than a simple yes or no. Our program is not Hospice care it is Palliative Care. Palliative care is something very sacred to us. Allow us to explain our Palliative Care Program to you.

Our Core Value of Sanctity of Life is that we believe life is a sacred gift from God and we therefore hold life, at all stages, in reverential esteem. While life should be preserved whenever possible, sickness, suffering, and death are part of life and are potential experiences of encountering God. We know that death, as the last stage of earthly life, is the prelude to eternal life. We are committed to witness to the gospel message of Jesus Christ and the teachings of the Roman Catholic Church. We foster palliative care, which is a holistic, person-centered approach to meeting the physical, social, psychological, spiritual, and emotional needs of the resident from the time of their admission throughout their stay with us.

Palliative Care defined by the Carmelite Sisters for the Aged and Infirm seeks to provide relief from the five domains of pain that persons experience when faced with aging, declining abilities, or a debilitating diagnosis. Physical, emotional, familial, spiritual, and psychological pain are all considered in our Palliative care program. Palliative Care is not reserved for those who are imminently dying, but does include end of life care for those who are dying. Palliative **care allows each resident to receive the appropriate care and services that brings comfort and the best possible quality of life. Palliative care can be combined with curative care or with less aggressive care. It is not the same as hospice care or end-of-life care, which is reserved only for those who are clearly dying. Our care includes end-of-life care and a sensitive, attentive, approach to residents who are dying.**

For the Carmelite Sisters for the Aged and Infirm, palliative care looks at the **whole person** and the variety of ways they might be suffering as they enter and live in our long-term care facility. It is this comprehensive, holistic, person-centered approach that sets the Carmelite Sisters' palliative care apart from Hospice care which only address the person's needs when they are at end of life. We have done this through developing a formalized Palliative Care Program which involves three critical pieces: providing education, using a team approach, and assessing the five domains of pain. All persons served by the Carmelite Sisters for the Aged and Infirm receive palliative care upon admission to Garvey Manor. This interdisciplinary method involves caring for the whole person, focusing on well-being, comfort, and peace of mind.

"Palliative Care, is an expression of the properly human attitude of taking care of one another, especially if those who suffer. It bears witness that the human experience is always precious even if marked by age and sickness."

However, while in Florida, calls from Garvey Manor were updating her that her sister's health was changing. Staff wondered whether the resident was going to hold until Chris could return. Marie was able to facilitate the live facetime conversation from the airport in Florida between the two sisters. They were able to share one last moment together as later that evening the resident passed away. Not only did the sisters get to talk to one another but they got to SEE one another, and to say goodbye.

GIVING BACK

Hurricane Harvey and Irma relief efforts held at the Manor.

As catastrophic flooding effected the Gulf Coast region of our country, Bishop Mark is asking the faithful to pray for victims of Hurricane/Tropical Storm Harvey and Irma to be as generous as possible in offering.

The Bishop has asked the clergy of the Diocese to take up a special collection at every parish, church, and chapel in Altoona-Johnstown as soon as possible.

All monies collected will go to Catholic Charities USA, which is already assisting in the areas affected by the storm. One hundred percent of donations to CCUSA for hurricane Harvey and Irma disaster relief is going to help those in need in the disaster area. None of the funding is being taken out for administrative expenses.

Garvey Manor collected donations in the Chapel and staff participated in a "Dress Down Day" where staff gave a donation for the privilege to dress down. \$1,000 was collected for the cause. Anyone who still wishes to give can make a donation, which will be directed to this cause.
