The holiday of Purim is the most celebratory holiday in the Jewish calendar year. Although the events portrayed in the Book of Esther cannot be historically verified, the Book or Scroll of Esther – the Megillah – serves as an allegory describing the life and lot of the Jewish people in an alien and hostile world. But good can conquer evil, and the reading of the Megillah renews this hope for all of us.

The author of this Biblical Book is unknown. Esther hides her Jewish identity at first and God is not mentioned though His influence is certainly felt in the ultimate redemption of the Jews of ancient Persia. Mordecai is royally honored; Esther finds her purpose in life; Haman is hanged, and the Jews achieve happiness, celebration, joy and honor.

We can learn important lessons from all the happenings in the Megillah. At times we all wear "masks" of one kind or another to disguise our real selves in order to find favor in the eyes of others. But from Purim we learn to tear away the "masks" and our pretentiousness and be our true and authentic selves where our "neshama" can shine forth! We also learn from this holiday that we – like Esther – can find our special purpose in life and pursue its fulfillment. We each can make a difference! And even more important, we learn from the story of Purim that we dare not even think of destroying others because they are "different", as Haman designed to do to the entire Jewish population of ancient Persia.

We need to affirm the basic concept in Judaism that all human beings are created in God's image, and that we therefore must acknowledge the sacred worth of everyone who lives by a set of moral values.

So, let us learn from our heritage, and be proud of who we are and what we represent! And may we be worthy of many occasions for celebration in the years to come!

Epidemic

Falling is an epidemic here for us old people. It is one of the most common reasons for ending up in the hospital or Grancell.

This past January within a 10-day period, 3 of our residents fell on their apartment floors and lay for hours before they were lucky enough to have a friend who kept looking for them.

In one case, a friend was waiting to go to the Dining Room. When he failed to show up and did not respond to her calls, she went to his apartment, heard him moaning and called Security who rescued him. Paramedics took him to the hospital.

In the second case, a resident fell, could not get up, and continued to sleep on the bathroom floor for several hours, expecting a caregiver or a friend to find him. He was finally discovered, and the paramedics were called to help him.

The third case was more interesting. After the resident fell and could not get up, he was confident that he would be discovered in several hours by a relative in Pennsylvania. This person calls him several times every day. He knew that if he did not answer the phone, the relative would call Concierge and get him some help. Paramedics came and took him to the hospital.

There is another way they could have been rescued even if they could not have activated the pendant. We have a morning check-in system at Fountainview. It is a voluntary program. I believe it should be mandatory for everyone, even if they have a companion.

You call (818) 654-5570 every morning. You will be connected to a special voicemail and, at the signal, you simply announce your apartment number. This indicates that you are alive and well. At 11 AM the Concierge listens to the calls and if someone is missing, they call you. If you do not respond, Security will come to your apartment and check to see if you need help.














Cuban Exhibit
