Meet George & Grace Schmidt, a loving example that long term commitments still exist. They were married in 1952 just before George was drafted into the Marines. Once the military years were completed, they settled in Colby, Wisconsin and raised seven children, almost eight. They did experience the sadness of a miscarriage. The little one was laid to rest near a baby sister that George's mom & dad lost years prior.

George was the epitome of what a family provider was. After working the family dairy farm, he worked part time in the local grocery store for 25 years. Grace was the faithful homemaker & truly George's better half, aka soulmates. They were on dance



teams together. George took great care of the flower patch in the back yard. Grace would frequently find him on his hands & knees pulling weeds out of the petunia beds.

Grace began to take on the role of being his caregiver when George was diagnosed with Vascular Dementia in 2013. "I'm his wife. You do what you have to do". Grace took some courses & found a respite facility for George when she desperately needed a break in the day. Their children began sensing that their dad was eventually going to need more help than what their mom could provide.

With the loving encouragement of their children, George & Grace moved from their home in Colby to Morrow Home Assisted Living in September, 2015. Grace had been caring for George as best as she could while in Colby but it was taking a toll on her. At MaryCrest, Grace slowly began accepting the help from staff to care for George, much to the family's relief.

The children were glad that their mom was able to regain her own strength. Unfortunately, George's needs escalated to the point that George needed to transfer to BridgePath Advanced Assisted Living, yet another huge transition for Grace as she would not be transferring with George. "Even though we're not in the same room, George is just steps away. He still calls me by my name." What a trooper you have been, Grace!

While we all wish our loved ones did not have to deal with ailments, we are truly honored to provide this continuum of services to our residents. "I've made a lot of good friends here" states Grace. "I feel safe," to which their family agrees.
