Christian Health Care Adult Day Services Client Juspines Staff and Seniors

Christian Health Care Adult Day Services of Wayne has several distinctive features. The medical day program, with an additional location in Wyckoff, offers health care, nutrition services, socialization, exercise, activities, pastoral care, and transportation. It also counts among its clients a true legend. Ninety-six-year-old Charlie D'Angelo holds the Guinness World Record for driving an ice cream truck for the longest period of time – 30 years! The Clifton resident, with his outgoing personality and artistic talent, inspires both clients and staff.

"Charlie is, for lack of a better word, awesome," says Aimee Restifo, LCSW, the program's Administrator/Social Worker. "He takes great pride in his World Record distinction. He has outfits for all the special events that we have here. He checks our calendar every night to see what events are scheduled for the next day so that he can dress appropriately. He has a great sense of humor and is such a wonderful person. He is always helping others and looking out for the other clients in our program."

The availability of physical therapy led Mr. D'Angelo to Christian Health Care Adult Day Services of Wayne last spring. Here, individualized care plans, with input from the clients' personal physicians, are developed so that seniors receive maximum benefits from the program.

"Dad had fallen and needed physical therapy. The program he was attending at the time didn't offer therapy, so the staff referred us to Christian Health Care Adult Day Services of Wayne," says his daughter Roxanne D'Angelo.

Jamie Crowell, RN-BC, Nursing Director, assessed Mr. D'Angelo and recommended physical therapy to help improve his walking, gait, strength, and balance. He participated in therapy three days a week for nearly two months. Mr. D'Angelo also receives nutritional guidance from Joan Katz, RD, the program's dietitian. He follows a gluten-free diet, so Mrs. Katz reviews the program's menu with him, highlighting the gluten-free selections.

Christian Health Care Adult Day Services of Wayne also helps keep Mr. D'Angelo's mind sharp, as he explores his artistic endeavors, which he shares with staff and clients.

"Dad created sticker art for his ice-cream truck – Iggy's Igloo," Ms. D'Angelo says. "When he retired in 2009 he had amassed a sizeable collection of stickers. He started to decoupage flower pots with the stickers. Now he has a wide range of canvases."

Mr. D'Angelo started delivering ice cream on a bicycle when he was 16. After he married his sweetheart Marion in 1945, he opened a butcher shop and a small grocery store in Newark, his hometown. Eventually he sold the butcher shop and passed on the grocery store to his grandson. As he approached 60 he wasn't ready to retire, so he hit the road with an ice-cream truck - for three decades.

"I have a good life and a good family," says Mr. D'Angelo, whose wife passed away a year and a half ago.

Now, Christian Health Care Adult Day Services of Wayne benefits from his positive energy and joie de vivre.

"I give Christian Health Care Adult Day Services of Wayne a score of 110!" says Mr. D'Angelo, who attends the program four days a week. "The staff is wonderful. They help you in every way."

When Beatrice Fink decided to move to assisted living, the "vetting process," says her son Bob, "was extensive. **There are** a lot of residences in this area to consider. Ultimately, the decision to move to The Longview Assisted Living Residence at Christian Health Care Center (CHCC) was hers. The fact that CHCC has been around for as long as it has, that it has a long tradition of a caring mission, that it has a well-established reputation, and financial and operational strength - all of these factors meant an awful lot to me, my sisters Corinne and Carol, and my mother."

As part of researching Longview, Mr. Fink contacted individuals associated with The Valley Hospital in Ridgewood, where he serves as a trustee.

"I asked them about Longview, and their reviews were all very positive," he says. "Mom moved to Longview nearly six years ago. She has become very well-acclimated and she's doing terrifically."


Mrs. Fink was born in Manhattan, where she met her husband Martin. The couple, who were married for more than 40 years, later moved to the Astoria section of Queens. Mrs. Fink did clerical work until her youngest daughter went to college.

"When my sister went to college, my mother decided to do the same," Mr. Fink says. "She got a bachelor's degree in social work from Hunter College and went on to a 25-year career as a social worker for Catholic Charities in New York."

Mrs. Fink remained in Astoria until six years ago when she suffered a stroke. She and her children recognized that she would benefit from an assisted-living environment.

At Longview, personalized care in a secure community supports and fosters each individual's maximum level of independence. Longview offers 24-hour nursing support and customized levels of care. The goal is for each resident to live to his or her highest potential. Additionally, the diverse calendar of events provides purpose in each day.

"The range of activities means a lot to mom and to us," Mr. Fink says. "She was very active, so we wanted to make sure that she would still have a full menu of recreational and other activities that would keep her vital. At Longview there are so many of these that she can avail herself of. She enjoys everything from bingo to arts projects to concerts to movies. She loves when the



children from the Child Day Care Center, which is located on the ground floor of Longview, come to visit. There's no question that they brighten her day."

His mom concurs.

"Everything about Longview is very nice – the activities, my neighbors," Mrs. Fink says. "And the food is excellent!"

"Sometimes too excellent!" jokingly says her son. "Seriously, though, the menu selection is great."

The Fink family reserves the highest praise for what they consider Longview's greatest asset: the staff.

"All the staff – administration, nurses, dining staff, aides, and others who take care of my mom's needs on a daily basis – are really warm and caring and go the extra mile to make sure that she's happy," Mr. Fink says. "They make Longview unique and special. They create a supportive, warm, and comfortable environment - a home."

"Short-term Rehab at CHCC is the benchmark for excellence!"

Like most couples married for nearly a quarter century, Valerie and Jerry Shurko have shared countless milestones, journeys, laughs, and tears. What sets the Ramsey couple apart, however, are dual short-term rehab stays at Christian Health Care Center. Mr. Shurko was a patient on The David F. Bolger Post-acute Care Unit for three months after suffering a stroke; Mrs. Shurko's two-week stay following a left-knee replacement came shortly after her husband was discharged.

"Short-term rehab at Christian Health Care Center is the benchmark for excellence," says Mrs. Shurko, who underwent rehab at three other facilities for two hip and right-knee replacements.

"The care is excellent. The staff is excellent. The food is excellent. The facility and grounds are beautiful. The Center is perfect in terms of providing everything that a patient needs."

The Shurkos' introduction to

short-term rehab at CHCC came through visiting a neighbor.

"As we visited her and watched her progress, we saw the very tender care that she received and how much her family appreciated the way she was cared for," Mrs. Shurko says. "So when Jerry was ready to be discharged from The Valley Hospital to short-term rehab, I wanted him to come to Christian Health Care Center because of the wonderful care that our neighbor received."

When Mr. Shurko arrived at CHCC, his left arm and leg marginally functioned and he was unable to stand and walk. Physical therapists focused on strengthening muscles through traditional exercise, exercise machines, and hand weights. Occupational therapists concentrated on accomplishing day-to-day tasks, such as getting dressed and performing household tasks.

"I couldn't stand on my own when I came to CHCC," says Mr. Shurko, a retired electrical engineer. "I would have been happy to have left using a walker, but the rehab staff wouldn't hear of that. I was able to walk out on my own without a walker or cane. It's not what I expected of a rehab center. It was grand!"

In addition to physical, occupational, and speech therapists, Mr. Shurko's multidisciplinary team included clinicians, dietitians, social workers, activities staff, and chaplains. Individuals requiring short-term rehab following a stroke are just a portion of the patient population. Others who may also benefit include those who are recovering from cardiac surgery or pneumonia; have a chronic illness, such as cardiac disease, renal disease, or diabetes; or have had a joint replacement, such as Mrs. Shurko.

"Jerry's care at CHCC was so, so wonderful. I knew exactly where I wanted to go for rehab following my knee replacement at The Valley Hospital," she says.

Mrs. Shurko's physical therapy took place in the new

14,000-square-foot Bolger Gym & Wellness Center. The goal was to strengthen her new knee and upper-arm muscles.

"The new gym is fabulous!" Mrs. Shurko says. "Through physical therapy, I became stronger and learned to stand and breathe correctly. Because I delayed the knee replacement for years, my posture was bent and I favored my right side to compensate for the pain on my left side. I left with such a greater range of motion than when I came in."

Occupational therapy took place in the new Transitional Care Suite, which includes a kitchen/dining area, family room, laundry room, bedroom, and bathroom.

"Initially using a walker and then a cane, I made pizza in the oven. I took all the ingredients out of the refrigerator. I worked in the sink. I did the dishes. I changed bedding. I did laundry," says Mrs. Shurko, who worked at BMW North America headquarters and arranged BMW test drives for national automotive journalists before she retired. "I proved to myself that I could accomplish these tasks. The suite is so well-designed."

While the Shurkos praise the benefits of CHCC's state-of-the-art apparatus and technology, they give equal credit to the staff for their successful short-term rehab.

"Everyone is so kind and patient. It is remarkable," Mrs. Shurko says. "There's friendliness here. Everyone speaks so nicely to each other and about each other. The employees are very, very supportive of one another. I think that the criteria for hiring at CHCC is that everyone must smile!"

Occupational therapy is enhanced in the Transitional Care Suite. This area, which includes a kitchen/dining area, family room, laundry room, bedroom, and bathroom, affords privacy and a home-like feel. Here, too, caregivers are educated on the proper placement of assistive devices such as shower grab bars, as well as different types of durable medical equipment available for patients when they return home.


Mr. Kuiken has also helped communities around the globe. He served as a Peace Corps volunteer for two years in the West African country of Mali.

Considering social and academic pressures faced by today's youth, it's not surprising that anxiety disorders are more prevalent than any other mental-health illness among adolescents. The most common are generalized anxiety disorder, panic disorder, social anxiety disorder, and separation anxiety. Each may have physical, psychological, and/or behavioral symptoms.

When anxiety impedes daily functioning, professional intervention may be necessary. Christian Health Care Counseling Center provides outpatient treatment for children and adolescents, as well as adults, seniors, and families. Following an assessment, an individualized treatment plan is developed. Cognitive-behavioral therapy (CBT) is one therapeutic modality that has proven to be very effective. Through CBT, youngsters learn skills and techniques to help reduce anxiety. Some youth may also require medication to alleviate disruptive symptoms that can interfere with daily life.

Parents can help reduce anxiety faced by their children. The Christian Health Care Counseling Center staff offers the following techniques/coping skills:

- Be aware of your child's behaviors.
- Build trust.
- · Listen and be available.
- Encourage the expression of feelings.
- Teach and model good emotional responses to stress.
- Encourage children to tell you if they are stressed.
- Promote healthy friendships, activities, and exercise.
- Eat dinner together.
- Encourage resiliency.
- Monitor alarming television or news programs.
- Be patient when your child makes poor decisions.
- Discuss the harmful effects of drugs and alcohol.
- Take care of yourself.

- Communicate with school personnel.
- Seek assistance of a school counselor or therapist if things become overwhelming.
- Encourage positive problem-solving and coping skills.
- Make expectations clear.
- · Learn from mistakes.
- Don't overreact.
- Develop a clear academic schedule for homework.
- · Provide consistent positive limits and discipline.
- Express feelings appropriately.
- Provide a feeling of safety.
- · Encourage good nutrition and sleeping habits.
- Relax and have fun at home.


Son-Light

- hope in sharing feelings and experiences.



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
